1. Course objectives

Students will acquire basic knowledge about the most common skin and venereal diseases. They will get familiar with various skin lesions and will be able to recognise clinical manifestations of skin and venereal diseases, with special focus on presentation on the head, neck and oral mucous membranes: skin infections, skin diseases of the face and scalp, influence of UV radiation on the skin, differential diagnoses of facial oedema, allergic skin diseases, allergens, used in dental medicine, malignant skin tumors, autoimmune and erythematosquamous skin diseases and manifestations of venereal diseases.

Differential diagnosis, basic diagnostic tests, topical and systemic treatment, epidemiology and preventive measures of skin and venereal diseases will be presented.

Students will be able to recognise the most common skin and venereal diseases of the skin and mucous membranes, using patient's history and clinical examination.

2. Comprehensive outline of the course organisation

Lectures constitute of 15 hours. The most common skin and venereal diseases will be presented.

Seminars constitute of 7 hours. Selected topics of skin and venereal diseases, with special attention on the head, neck and oral mucous membranes will be discussed.

Clinical rotations constitute of 8 hours and will take place at the Department of dermatovenereology. Students will be divided into smaller groups and will attend the outpatient department and hospital wards.

Lecture are not obligatory for students.

At least 80% of attendance at the seminars is necessary to approach the written exam.

Clinical rotations are obligatory in the whole extent.

In case of justified absence, the student will have to replace or substitute missing obligations, according to agreement with the head of the department.

3. Description of on-going assessment of knowledge and skills

On-going assessment of knowledge will take part while preparing and presenting the seminars. However, it will not influence the final mark of the exam.

4. Required conditions for the final examination (Course Exam)

Requirements for the course exam is attendance at seminars (at least 80% of seminars) and at clinical rotations in the whole extent (8 hours).

5. Final assessment and examination of knowledge and skills (Course Exam)

Final assessment of knowledge for module Dermatovenereology will take part at written colloquium.

Written colloquium includes 40 questions with one correct answer and will take 40 minutes. Each correct answer brings 1 point. Positive assessment means that at least 22 questions were answered correctly. Grade marks are as follows:

22 – 25 points: 6

26 - 29 points: 7

30 - 33 points: 8

34 - 37 points: 9 38 - 40 points: 10

For improvement of the mark repeating of the colloquium is needed.

The final mark for the subject "Medical clinic 1" is the average mark for all three modules (Dermatovenereology, Neurology and Psychiatric diseases).

6. Other provisions

During the written exam it is not allowed to use:

- electronic devices, such as mobile phones, calculators, photographic cameras or other scanners, tablets, laptops, and other electronic devices,
- · books, note-books and other written materials,
- bags, backpacks, jackets, coats and food.

It is not allowed to write down the written questions. Communication with other students and other ways of cheating is not allowed. The staff will take off the question form if students will not respect these rules. In this case it is not possible to proceed to oral exam.

If the colloquium will be performed for the fourth time and fifthly, the exam will be provided with a commission. If the exam will be performed for the sixth time, one of the members of the commission will be from another institute or department.
